## Excellence in Reporting Awards Deadline is Near

By the time you see this issue, there will be only about two weeks remaining to submit nominations for the two EIR annual awards. They are for the Best Grand Jury Report and for the News Media. The deadline is June 30, 2016. Application for both must be made on our website. The user-friendly application may be found at <http://cgja.org/eir>.

## Best Grand Jury Report Nominations

A single investigation or a series of directly related investigations done within the preceding five years are eligible (2011-2015 -- thereby allowing sufficient time for responses).

To justify the award, the report needs to compete with other nominations on the criteria shown below.

- Report quality -- legible, documented, succinct, complete, and understandable
- Citizen Impact: Importance or severity of problem
- Duration/persistence of the problem
- Difficulty of the investigation - many agencies, bureaucratic interference (e.g., denials, subpoenas), etc.
- Substantiated findings and recommendations within the report
- Exposure of the report by the media, or response from the public
- Documented success of the investigation

A single investigation or a series of directly related investigations done within the preceding five years are eligible (2011-2015 -- thereby allowing sufficient time for responses).

Last year's winner was Santa Cruz for Desalination and Alternatives: Water for a Thirsty County. The previous year's winner was San Francisco County's report on the city's technology.

### **News Media Award**

To qualify for this award, the nominator must describe and document how the media outlet or reporter met the following criteria:

- Increased familiarity with and understanding of the grand jury system
- Increasing public awareness of a specific grand jury investigation
- Improved public understanding of the issue investigated
- Community awareness of the outcome of a grand jury investigation

Last year, the award went to Lompoc Record for its coverage of A Failure of Oversight: Lompoc Housing and Community Development Corporation, a report issued by the 2011-12 Santa Barbara County Grand Jury. The year before, The Record of Stockton won the award for reporting the failure of support for at-risk youth in San Joaquin county. In past years the Appeal Democrat (an online outlet), Sacramento Bee, Oakland Local, San Francisco Chronicle, Mendocino Beacon/Fort Bragg Advocate News, Napa Valley Register, Tribune of San Luis Obispo, and Marin Independent Journal have received awards for their support of the county Grand Jury.

For either award, one nomination per county, please. Nominations may be made only by a CGJA chapter or Association for its county. Where there is no chapter or association, nominations may be made by a CGJA member who resides in the county. The same grand jury report may qualify for both awards as has happened in the past.

Awards will be announced at the CGJA Annual Conference in Sacramento on November 5, 2016.

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### **Little Hoover Commission Executive Director to Address Annual Conference**

Executive Director Carole D'Elia of the Little Hoover Commission has accepted our invitation to be our key-note speaker at our 2016 Annual Conference on November 5 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Sacramento.

D'Elia will provide an overview of the Little Hoover Commission, its brief history, and its bipartisan governance structure. She also will compare the work and role of the commission to the grand jury process and discuss current and recent commission projects and progress in implementing commission recommendations by working with the legislature and the governor. The Little Hoover Commission is a bipartisan, independent state-oversight agency.

Carole D'Elia (Deh-LEE-ah) has served as executive director of the Little Hoover Commission since November 2013. She has been with the commission for 15 years, previously serving as deputy executive director and project manager.

During the past two and a half years as executive director, D'Elia has overseen the adoption of twelve commission reports on a broad spectrum of topics, including: Denti-Cal, the state's dental insurance program for low income Californians, climate change adaptation, renewable energy, open meeting acts, the underground economy, and improving interactions with government. Previously, she directly managed numerous studies for the commission, including extensive work in the areas of criminal justice, juvenile justice, and sentencing. As executive director, she works with the legislature and the governor to enact laws or change policy to get commission recommendations implemented.

Her prior work experience includes research, writing, and publishing. She has a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Florida.

Monitors legislative activity regarding issues that affect the grand jury system; provides answers to questions regarding grand jury law process, powers and jurisdiction.

### Membership Relations

Encourages membership in CGJA as well as in local chapters; facilitates exchange of best practices among the chapters; ensures coordination of members and chapters with Association initiatives.

### Public Relations

Manages website, publishes Journal, educates public in support of California's regular grand juries.

### Training

Develops and conducts annual training programs for new grand jurors presented at statewide locations.

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## The Role of the Carryover Juror

Whether you use the term carryover or holdover juror, the authority for allowing the superior court to appoint a grand juror to serve a second term on the succeeding grand jury is in Penal Code section 901. That section allows the presiding judge to name up to 10 sitting jurors to serve a second consecutive term. While some do not, most courts do appoint carryover jurors.

The former juror can bring to the new jury a wealth of knowledge and experience. How that knowledge and experience are utilized may have a significant impact upon the success of the succeeding grand jury. The carryover juror has been through the process before and can be of great assistance to fellow jurors on the suc-

ceeding grand jury. A familiarity with local government operations and the procedure for scheduling and holding interviews, conducting investigations, and writing, reviewing, and releasing reports can give the new grand jury a head start on the work at hand.

On occasion, however, a former juror can be disruptive and impede the effectiveness of the new grand jury. Such disruption may occur if the former juror attempts, alone or in concert with other carryovers, to dictate how the jury should operate or what the jury should investigate. Former jurors have no more, and no less, authority than the newly impaneled jurors. Former jurors must understand that what occurred in last year's grand jury remains confidential and cannot be revealed to the new grand jury.

Problems can arise when a grand jury has voted to pass on to the succeeding grand jury an investigation file pursuant to Penal Code section 924.4. Even then, the carryover juror remains bound by Penal Code section 911 (the oath of confidentiality) and Penal Code section 924.1 (the confidentiality statute) not to disclose to the new grand jury the substance of any discussion, vote, or evidence adduced by the prior grand jury that is not contained within the investigative file.

A carryover juror must not try to "take ownership" of any investigation that was initiated by the preceding grand jury. While an investigative file may have been passed forward, the new jury has no obligation to initiate its own investigation in connection with the issues raised within that investigative file. While that information is likely to be substantial, Penal Code section 939.9 requires that "A grand jury shall make no report, declaration, or recommendation on any matter except on the basis of its own investigation of the matter by such grand jury." Accordingly, all investigative material must be reviewed by the new grand jury, and all interviews deemed necessary to the investigation must be undertaken by the new grand jury before they are able to write a report with their own findings and recommendations.

The role of the carryover grand jurors can be beneficial or detrimental. It is up to them and the other members of the new grand jury to work together to reap the benefit of the experience that the carryover jurors bring to the table.

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## **Marin County Chapter**

Regarding our interview process, mentioned in our prior update, our Selection Advisory Committee, (SAC) chaired by Tom Borden and assisted by Jean Gunn, just completed our interviews for 2016-2017 Grand Jury applicants. Unfortunately, we did not have the number of applicants we hoped for, but enough to cover the full jury and 10 alternates. Upon the recommendations of the Superior Court Judge, we held the two-part interview process. The process was as follows: 1) 5-7 applicants met with a facilitator as a group for a problem solving activity of about 15 minutes. Two observers noted their responses. 2) Two Marin Chapter members then interviewed each applicant for approximately 30 minutes. There were 2-3 sessions per day. At the end of each day, the interviewers and the observers compared notes and wrote their recommendations. We noted that the applicants enjoyed the group activity. We changed our interview questions this year and found some were redundant, so the SAC committee will meet to work on some revisions, per committee suggestions.

We just completed a revision of our training manual, thanks to the hard work of Rich Treadgold and Paul Premo. Through the efforts of Owen Haxton, our membership chair, we now have 99 members in our chapter, 55 of whom are life members, quite an accomplishment!

We are coming to the end of our term. New officers will be in place after our Annual meeting scheduled for June 14<sup>th</sup>. I give my sincere thanks to all the hard working board members and committees that made all this happen.



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### State Bar Approves CGJA as MCLE Provider



The State Bar of California has approved CGJA as an MCLE (minimum continuing legal education) provider, allowing us to offer continuing education credit to attorneys who attend our regional seminars this July in Sacramento, Redding, and Visalia.

Two units of credit will be available for attorneys (either grand jurors or legal advisors) attending the regional seminar sessions “Grand Jury Law” and “Legal Topics.” An additional two credits will be available to grand jury legal advisors at our new breakout session, “Legal Advisors’ Workshop,” which will include a round-table discussion of legal

issues and best practices. Preregistration is required.

To further our educational mission, CGJA has stepped up its outreach to judges and legal advisors. Last October, we taught at the presiding judges’ annual management conference – and we’ve been invited back this year. We anticipate that being able to offer MCLE credit will draw more legal advisors to our seminars, opening another valuable avenue for education and collaboration.

Approved PayPal Pro as the sole merchant service company for credit card transactions.


The board took no actions at its May 24, 2016 meeting.

## Ask the Trainer

### Questions submitted recently by jurors:

**Q.** We are required to give a copy of the individual final report to the affected agency two working days prior to its public release. Is it okay to send it by email?

**A.** While using email to deliver documents is certainly a common and efficient way of conducting business, you must keep in mind that this particular document is still confidential until it has been publicly released; therefore, many grand juries still hand-deliver the reports. However, if you are going to use electronic transmission, make sure that the cover email reminds the recipient that the report is confidential until its public release and should not be shared with others until that time. For added protection, the document can either be sent through a secure network or password-protected; you can call the recipient and give them a single-use password to use for opening the attachment. You should consult with your legal advisor before proceeding, and you may wish to add a policy regarding electronic delivery of reports to your Procedures Manual.

**Q.** What kind of photos are allowed to be included in grand jury reports?

**A.** As a "best practice," we recommend that any photo relevant to the grand jury's investigation and included within an individual report be treated like any other evidence relied upon by the grand jury - that is, it must be verified. How can you verify a photo? You should make sure it accurately depicts the subject matter pictured, that it is an original and unaltered photo, and that two or more jurors saw the scene or item depicted. We do not recommend including photos of employees of the entity, or photos of the jurors who conducted the investigation. In a consolidated end-of-term report, however, it is quite common for there to be a photo of the entire grand jury or photos on the cover of scenes from areas within the county.
